			As a result of ongoing Government cuts, Middlesbrough schools:
			 Will have lost £27.6 million in overall funding between 2015 – 2020. Will have lost £519 per pupil.
			 Will have lost 2519 per pupil. Have seen 181 more Secondary School pupils taught in large classes since 2015.
			 Has seen staff losses owing in part to recruitment and retention issues.
			 Must bear the brunt of unfunded National Insurance increases. See inadequate High Needs Block Funding, leaving our most vulnerable pupils without the support they need.
