The Panel feels that the Council should take a firmer stance with those positively identified as fly-tippers and believes that the Council should impose the maximum £400 FPN for offenders, but that prosecution should still be pursued in more serious cases. This will bring Middlesbrough Council in-line with its neighbours in Redcar and Cleveland, Stockton and Hartlepool. The Panel considers that ECS is best placed to formulate the details as to whether an option for a discounted payment should be offered for early payment of the FPN and, if so, what that amount should be set at. This should be considered by the relevant Committee for approval or otherwise.	 Enforcement Officers always consider imposing the maximum penalty of £400 for fly-tipping offences. Middlesbrough Council has a sliding scale regarding fixed penalties for Fly-tipping and Enforcement Officers consider any discount based upon the severity of the offence depending on the volume of fly-tipping. Going forward, the service will seek to impose a fine of £400 in the first instance. Consideration will be given for reductions in certain circumstances. Severe or repeated offences of fly- tipping would in most cases result in prosecution rather than a Fixed Penalty Notice. Middlesbrough Council have had a positive outcome with 8 out of 9 Fixed Penalty Notices served since July 2017 being paid within the lesser timescale of 10 days.
