Schools are able to choose to deliver this service themselves or seek another provider. They are not mandated to take the Council service and are free to commission whoever they choose to deliver this service, indeed a number of schools have moved to an alternative provider in the last 12 months. 						The Stage one impact assessment that was completed and submitted to Executive in October, seeking approval to consult on this proposal. At that stage one, there were no concerns that the proposal could have a disproportionate adverse impact on any of the protected characteristics. During the course of the consultation it became clear that there were concerns from the public that the proposal would have an adverse impact on children and their families. Acknowledging this concern, a stage 2 has now been completed to explore those concerns.	
						The provision of school meals is a discretionary function for the Council. Schools are free to procure this service from other companies and they also set the changes for meals. In some cases there is already a disconnect between the fee the Council charge for a meal and the fee the school charges, with schools having increased the fee. In this case the school retains the balance. Feedback from the consultations highlighted a range of opinions in relation to the proposal from those who felt no child should have to pay for a meal to others that felt all children should pay regardless of need. These issues are for national government and are not within the scope of this proposal to consider.	
Age						Consultation feedback from the budget consultation online consultation was that there was a slight majority against the proposal. Within the free text, a number of responders expressed concern about the impact on families and children. Within the targeted consultation there was a majority against the proposal, the vast majority of respondents identified that they were parents with children currently accessing this service.	
						In line with the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) and the feedback, the Council considered whether it could avoid this perceived disproportionate impact on children. It is felt that it is not possible to continue to provide a nutritious midday meal to all children at current standards without increasing the cost of the meals that have not been increased since 2009. In line with the PSED consideration was then given to whether the impact of the proposal could be mitigated to address the concerns. Given the need to maintain a viable level of service, which schools are free to contract from elsewhere, it is not felt the Council could reduce the cost of the proposed increase. The council has worked to minimise the increases proposed already to minimise the impact on families who have to pay for school meals, particularly larger families. Those that are entitled to free school meals will continue to receive them.	
						Consideration was then given to whether this proposed increase could be justified. Given the steps taken to minimise the increases, the fact that the increase is in line with the increases in living wage, and the length of time since costs were last increased, it is felt that the impact of the proposal on children and their families is justified.	
						Evidence to support this assessment includes analysis of the targeted consultation undertaken with schools and parents / carers and feedback from the universal consultation undertaken as part of the budget setting process.
