The Panel recommend that these be explored and be kept up to date on progress.	<ul> <li>We are not implementing the recommendation.</li> <li>Officers met with and explored the option of a town centre foodbank and the Trussel Trust have confirmed there is no current need for an additional town centre foodbank location but more a need to develop existing locations through increasing supplies.</li> <li>A lot goes into opening a foodbank and the Trussel Trust need to focus their resources on meeting the current demand through supporting their existing centres, as they have seen a 12% increase on usage so far this financial year, expecting this to rise to 20% by April.</li> <li>The foodbank in Hemlington is currently a priority as its previous location has been condemned so they are using medical centre as a temporary venue.</li> <li>The two busiest foodbanks are North Ormesby and Clifton St (near Tesco on Linthorpe Rd).
