

### Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

Mandatory conditions in accordance with Section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003:

Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol:

- (i) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
- (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (ii) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Effective from 28 May 2014:

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1-
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(a);
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula-

$$P = D + (D X V)$$

#### Where:

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence-
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(b).
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4.—(1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- (1) The premise licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

  (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

## Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

#### LICENSING OBJECTIVES

#### **GENERAL - ALL FOUR LICENSING OBJECTIVES**

All staff will be trained in relation to the sale of age restricted goods. A CCTV system will operate at the store. An age recognition scheme such as Challenge 25 will be in place. A register of all challenged and refused sales will be maintained. A register of all major incidents of crime and disorder will be maintained. A system of prompts will be in place to ensure staff undertake age checks on age restricted products.

#### THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

- 1. The premises must be fitted with a colour digital CCTV system, covering both internal and external areas of the premises. The footage must be retained for a minimum of 31 days and must be able to be transferred onto a medium that can be viewed on Police computer systems.
- 2. When the store is open and trading, there must be a member of staff on duty who is fully trained and able to operate the CCTV system. They must be able to produce footage of CCTV to Police or any other Responsible Authority within a reasonable time, eg. 24 hours routine or immediately for investigation of serious crime.
- 3. An incident book must be kept at the premises and maintained to record all incidents, refusals and age challenges which occur at the premises. All such matters shall be timed, dated and signed by the author and produced to police or any Responsible Authority upon request. The DPS must check the incident book to ensure compliance.
- 4. A 'Challenge 25' Policy will be implemented with all staff insisting on evidence of age from any person appearing to be under the age of 25 and attempting to buy alcohol. The only acceptable forms of ID will be photographic ID bearing a date of birth that is either a passport, driving licence or recognised proof of age card accredited under the proof of age standards scheme (PASS). There shall be notices displayed at all points of sale and all entrances and exits to inform customers and remind staff that the premises is operating a 'Challenge 25' policy.
- 5. All staff will be fully trained and retrained on a six monthly basis in relation to the law relating to the sale of alcohol to under age persons, persons buying on behalf of under 18's (proxy sales) persons appearing under the influence of alcohol and also the operation of the associated 'Challenge 25' policy. Written training records to this effect, will be maintained and must be made available for inspection.
- 6. No alcohol is to be displayed or stocked within 5 metres of any entry/exit door.
- 7. The premises will be fitted with an industry standard approved Intruder Alarm System.

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

- 1. The requirements of the Fire officer will be complied with.
- 2. A fire risk assesment will be undertaken prior to the premises trading.

# THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

1. A regular litter pick of the stores external areas will be carried out.

# THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

- 1. All staff will be trained in relation to the sale of age restricted goods.
- An age recognition scheme such as 'Challenge 25' will be in place.
   A system of prompts will be in place to ensure staff undertake age checks on age restricted products.
   A register of all challenged and refused sales will be maintained.

#### Hi Louise

As one of the ward councillor for  $\operatorname{Hemlington}$  Ward I would like to object on the following grounds.

There is a problem with drinking in the shopping centre and has been on and off for a number of years. This is an issue that is frequently raised at Hemlington Community Council and drink related anti-social behaviour has meant that the Viewley Centre has been a policing priority on several occasions, including over recent months.

Police records however will not reflect the true extent of the problem as it is not an offence to drink in the centre which unfortunately for the people of Hemlington is not the subject of a DPPO despite requests from ward councillors to introduce one.

Due to problems with drinking in the centre ward councillors have requested via Community Council and more recently to the Police and Crime Commissioner that a DPPO be introduced in the centre.

At a Young Person's Surgery in March 2014, a young person approached Jeanette and I with concerns about anti-social behaviour and drinking in the centre which he felt prevented him and his friends from feeling safe there.

Observations from youth groups and local residents, as well as reports of gangs (of up to 40) coming in from the Low Lane end of Hemlington, indicate that this is largely due to young people coming into Hemlington from outside the area.

As ward councillors we get complaints about drinking, not only on an evening but also during the day in the centre by adults

I litter pick on the morning of Hemlington Market (1st Saturday of the month), most recently on Saturday August 2nd when I found empty cartons of Fosters lager, empty lager cans and cider bottles. The previous month I found empty Smirnoff vodka bottles and large cider bottles.

The worry is that these problems will simply occur earlier in the morning when children are going to nearby primary schools at Viewley Hill and St Gerards, after which alcohol will have been on sale for a couple of hours.

As a dog walker I do see older children going to Macmillan, passing through the centre on their way to the bus stop well before 8 o'clock and feel it is inappropriate for them to witness drinking at this early hour.

When Onestop were first coming to the Viewley Centre, officers from Licensing, Community Safety, the Police, Community Council and local councillors met with their managers and at that time local councillors opposed the idea of a 6am start to the licence and, again at that time, Onestop agreed to amend their plans with the licence to start from 8am. No

such consultation has been sought on this occasion.

When McColls applied for their licence, they too had voluntarily amended their plans from a 6am to 8am start at the request of ward councillors.

Presumably if this licence was granted to Onestop, both McColl's and Boozebox could simply follow suit, with three 6am licences in a small centre.

This is no way is a criticism of Onestop (other than applying for a 6 am licence) who have a very well run shop which is an asset to the centre

Consultation via Social Media on this issue with local residents has resulted in the following responses-names from Facebook can be supplied on request:

"Surely not enough people come in between 6am and 8am to buy alcohol to warrant this earlier sales application? If so, then maybe there needs to be more help for these people?"

"I think 8am is far too early as it is"

"I agree with you nicki there is no need as there is a 24 hoir garsge not far away and whoever needs alcohol that time in the morning should buy the night before and if they drink it they won't be up for 6"

"Far too early!! Should be 9 when children have gone into school and don't have to witness drunks!"

"What do they do with booze that time of the Morning  $\dots$  Do they put it on there Corn Flakes , far to early  $\dots$  Nuff said"

"6 am , 8 am whats the difference there both too early , at one time dont think u were allowed to buy booze b 4 11 am or was it 12 ?"

"I agree alcohol is for evenings and shouldnt be sold before lunch especially in such a close proximity to a school! Talk about setting a bad example."

"Groups of secondary school kids are already down the shops just after 7 before they catch buses to school. What are the licensed hours of the other license holders? Surely all should be in line with each other so one stop and McColl both able to sell from same time only."

"Too many booze shops in a small vicinity"

"Far too early Nicky we will certainly be objecting and we were all under the impression that once someone took over the old co op mc colls would have to stop selling alcohol."

"I hope this doesnt get passed, 8am is way too early so 6am is ridiciouls.....its bad enough seeing them sat on the benches at lunch time drinking and hideing it in there bags.....just no need at all.....should be changed to late afternoon to sell it...."

"That is too early at 8am never mind 6am, they should only b able to sell it at pub opening times 11am don't we have enough to worry about those shops already!"

"All thats going to happen is give Hemlington a worse name than its got already."

Dear Louise

As one of the local ward councillors form the Hemlington Ward I would like you to accept this email as my objection to the application for a variation of licence hours for One Stop, 43 Viewley Centre (PR123).

I would like to support my fellow councillor Nicky Walker's email, stating reasons for the objection. Many of the reasons which were given to us all relate to the issue of people drinking in the centre.

I would like to object on behalf of the residents of Hemlington who feel that any variation to the existing licence hours for the One Stop shop will add to problems of anti social behaviour which already exist in the centre. There have as my colleague states been reasons to make the area a policing priority to avoid the issues of people drinking in and around the very shop which wishes to extend their opening hours. We had a problem recently as my colleague Nicky Walker states in her email of gangs coming in to the area from other wards and causing problems we do not need this happening and would ask that you do not feel it necessary to grant this application. This objection is in keeping with the licensing objective of Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Prevention of Public Nuisance.

I also feel that we need to object on the grounds of Protection of children from Harm. As many children in this area travel to Macmillan Academy and other secondary schools which are outside of the area. They would be open to seeing the effects of early morning drinking going on in the centre and this would or could lead to them feeling unsafe. It is many residents fears that opening from 6am in the morning would only serve to exacerbate the problems already existing in the area. My colleague and I are regularly in the area and also witness people buying drinks and openly consuming them outside the very shops that they have bought them from . These are people who have a problem with drinking in the main and we feel that this is only going to cause more problems than already exist. Children are also visiting these shops on their way to school and also witness this happening. We need to try and avoid this happening in our very small but local shopping centre. These reasons stated also relate to the last of the Licensing objectives Public Safety.

We Nicky Walker and I, are trying hard to raise the profile of Hemlington and work with traders, and police in this area to ensure that residents feel safe and enjoy shopping safely in the Viewley Centre. We feel that by granting this variation you will undo all the good work which has been happening here and we urge you to refuse this variation.
