Application for a Dispersal Order under Section 30 of the Anti Social Behaviour Act 2003

Sir,

I submit this application in order to seek your authority for a Dispersal Order to be granted within the ward of Acklam. I request that the Dispersal Order period be for 14 days commencing at 00:01 hours on Friday 17th October 2014 to 23:59 hours on Friday 7th November 2014.

The boundaries for this application are as follows:-

The area bounded by and including Acklam Road, Ladgate Lane, Marton West Beck, Emerson Avenue and Green lane



Justification

The Analysts have provided a document relating to the Damage and Anti Social Behaviour in Middlesbrough from 17th October to 7th November 2013. Damage offences from January 2011 to November 2013 show a clear peak in reported offences during October each year; however the opposite has been identified for Anti Social Behaviour with incidents fluctuating throughout the research period.

Temporal analysis was conducted on damage and ASB which occurred on Mischief Night each year for the past three years revealing that damage and ASB has predominantly been reported on an evening between 18:00 – 20:59 hours.

Criminal Damage

For this period (17/10/13 – 07/11/13) there have been 180 reported offences of damage. Damage offences recorded in 2011, 2012 and 2013 showed that the daily average for damage during this two week period increased from 10 offences per day in 2012 to 13 offences in 2013. In contrast the number of damage offences recorded for Mischief Night (30th October), decreased by 37% from 64 offences in 2011 and by 14% in 2012. This reduction could be attributed to the increased number of policing and partnership agency resources deployed on this day and in certain areas the use of Dispersal Orders.

Offences peaked during the week of 17/10/13 – 31/10/13 with a 127 crimes before falling to 53 crimes in the following week. Clearly, damage offences drop the week after Mischief Night.

The highest levels of vehicle damage were identified in the Acklam and Marton West areas with 12 offences each

Comparisons with the previous two year periods shows that Acklam increases from 1 to 12 reports of vehicle damage

Anti-Social Behaviour

For this period (17/10/2013 – 07/11/2013), there have been 613 incidents. Although this accounts for an 11% increase on 2012 incidents fell by 12% in 2011

The number of ASB recorded for Mischief Night, has peaked in 2013 with 109 incidents, an increase of 12% compared to 97 incidents in 2011 but a slight decrease of 8% in 2012 when 118 incidents were recorded

ASB incidents recorded on Mischief Night 2013 were 148% higher than the daily average. ASB peaked during the week of 17/10/2013 – 31/10/2013 with 353 incidents, which decreased slightly by 93 incidents in the following week (01/11/2013 – 07/11/2013) similar to damage offences.

Acklam recorded 16 reports of Anti Social Behaviour from 17/10/2013 – 07/11/2013 with 7 reports being on Mischief Night

Due to these factors Dispersal Order would be effective in not only reducing Anti Social Behaviour levels but in deterring any increased associated within this period.

Integrated Neighbourhood Team 3 will take overall responsibility for policing the Dispersal Order during normal core patrol times. A briefing pack will be prepared and cascaded to response teams, to raise awareness of the extra powers available to officers throughout the period of the order.

The teams will be encouraged to assist local officers in enforcing the order when available to do so. The Dispersal Order will be published in The Gazette and notices placed within the ward, community centres and on roadside furniture informing residents of the additional powers officers can utilise.

This report has been compiled and submitted for your consideration and approval. I have attached the Dispersal Order authority and legal notices.



1 Information

- 1.1 The area bounded by and including **Acklam Road, Ladgate Lane, Marton West Beck, Emerson Avenue and Green Lane**. The relatively large area includes areas of private residential housing, school / colleges, recreational fields and a parade of shops which include a public library.
- 1.2 Reports from the public and intelligence from police sources has noted a considerable increase in incidents of anti-social behaviour and crime increasing rapidly from 17th October to 7th November. These incidents are occurring mainly around 30th October (Mischief Night) late afternoon/early evening through to November 5th (Bonfire Night) when groups of youths come from other estates into the area. Drug and alcohol abuse amongst these groups is believed to be prevalent and historically has resulted in to Crime. The groups then proceed through the estate. During this movement, the groups have been responsible for acting in an anti-social manner and committing offences, predominantly of damage and theft kindred offences.

1.3 Threat Assessment

This form of anti-social behaviour has a direct impact on the quality of life of the public and affects the trade of business, due to the intimidation the offenders create.

As a result of this a Dispersal Order under section 30 of the Anti-Social Behaviour Act has been granted by INT Superintendent Coates, which will run from **00.01 hours on Friday 17th October 2014 until 23.59 hours Friday 7th November 2014**

2 Intention

- 2.1 To enforce the Dispersal Order, preventing anti-social behaviour and related crime.
- 2.2 Give public reassurance by providing high visibility patrol, thus acting as a deterrent for offenders.

- ~~2.3 Work in partnership with all key agencies, including drug and alcohol rehabilitation agencies where offenders commit crime / anti-social behaviour due to being inebriated or in funding such a habit.~~
- 2.4 Reduce the fear of crime and intimidation from offenders

3 Method

- 3.1 Officers working across Middlesbrough will be briefed by their respective supervisors regarding the Dispersal Order and the limit of powers they have as a Police Constable enforcing such an order.
- 3.2 Middlesbrough Communications Staff will be responsible for recording the details of persons ordered to disperse from the designated area. It is the police constables / PCSO responsibility to ensure this information is passed to the communication staff. This record will be made on a designated Intergraph message which will remain open for the duration of the order
- 3.3 Neighbourhood policing will have overall responsibility for policing the Dispersal Orders during normal core patrol times and will monitor the running event for persons who are breaching dispersal requirements. Response teams are requested to assist in the policing of the areas during their normal patrols.

4 Administration

- 4.1 The Operation will be supervised by Inspector 310 Notman, Neighbourhood Policing Team 3/4.
- 4.2 PC 2154 Gowland, NPT 3/4 will distribute copies of the Order and its powers to NPT 3/4 and Response teams. He will also be responsible for collating and disseminating information on persons dispersed or arrested under the Order
- 4.3 Any officer who disperses anyone under the Order will record that person's details, (name, dob, address) in their pocket note books and then give the details to the resource staff to have it added to the running event, if possible then those person(s) will also be recorded on CCTV camera or digital camera along with their details.

5 Risk

5.1 Health and Safety Risk Assessment

I am PC 634 Mark Wilkinson of the Cleveland Police; I am currently the Acklam Ward Officer as part of the Middlesbrough Police Neighbourhood Policing Team based at Coulby Newham Police Office. I have been in the Police for nearly 29 years and in this specific post since the commencement of Neighbourhood policing in 2008. I have also previously worked in the Acklam area as local beat officer in the mid 1990's. I have gained an in-depth knowledge of this ward and the neighbouring wards of Kader and Brookfield. The residents in fact describe all 3 council wards as Acklam. All 3 wards have a similar make up and mix of residential, shops and businesses. This includes 2 large secondary schools and feeder primary schools. In all from my experience and contacts I have a full appreciation of the views and concerns of the population of Acklam ward.

I have regular meetings with residents and councillors at beat surgeries and community meetings within the ward. I routinely visit local shops and business properties during patrols. The ward has a network of Key Informants; residents who actively contact us with news/information as well as neighbourhood watch members. Acklam 20/20 environment group hold regular meetings which I can attend. During regular patrols I and my fellow officers are frequently approached by the public who voice their opinions, concerns and priorities for the area. I am also in frequent contact with other partner agencies who work in the Acklam ward such as Council Enforcement and the Street Wardens.

One of the greatest fears amongst residents is that Acklam Hall, the only grade I listed building in Middlesbrough and the main feature of the ward will be attacked and destroyed. The building and site of the hall are subject to development commencing this summer.

Continuation of Statement of **Mark Stephen Wilkinson**

The shopping parade is a regular target for shoplifters who create a mini crime wave when they frequent the area, and The Total Fina Petrol Station suffers from theft of petrol. Although precautions are in place such as CCTV they feel the perpetrators have no fear and don't care who they effect. There are occasional spates of motor crime with theft of and from motor vehicles within the ward, the residents are vigilant but when the crimes occur it causes upset and anger amongst the victims. This is mirrored when the occassional Burglary occurs with victims feeling there hard earned proprty has been violated and the those responsible are not being punished enough

The recent priority of Burglaries in the Tollesby area and the extra attention has successfully reduced the instances of burglary and anti-social behaviour. residents are still concerned re possible increases in the area and is still monitored.

The continued ASB around MILL HILL playing fields St Marys Walk and along Coniston Grove to Acklam Road around the Coronation has produced several Dispersal orders and notices over the past 2 years the most recent over the Mischief night to Christmas period. In general this was down to the Alcohol fuelled Anti social behaviour with youths legally or illegally obtaining alcohol from local stores on Acklam Road. We have a good relationship with the existing stores and do not believe they are selling to underage youths but any new licensed premises would just add to the availabilty of alcohol to the youths
