PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

- 1 To ensure Members of the Overview and Scrutiny Board have the opportunity to consider the future work programme of the Board.

RECOMMENDATION

- 2 It is recommended that the Overview and Scrutiny Board gives consideration to the future work programme of the Board and provides an initial indication of areas for future examination.

FUTURE WORK PROGRAMME

3. The agenda for Overview and Scrutiny Board has been increasing steadily over the last eighteen months. The integration of the Resources and Audit Scrutiny Panel with the increase in monitoring of recommendations and addressing the Executive Forward Work Plan are now established additions to OSB. Not only do these areas have the potential to further increase during 2005 – 06, the greatest increase in the development of OSB has been on Corporate Issues. As service departments gain greater awareness of the

requirement to engage with Scrutiny as a major political consultee on the development of Policy documents. The volume of submissions to the Board has become far greater than those contained within the Policy Framework of the constitution.

4. The Policy Framework contains a range of plans. These are presented below as the key areas, which will be presented to Scrutiny, at their scheduled time, for consideration.
