CREATING SAFER STRONGER COMMUNITIES

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Middlesbrough's Crime, Disorder Drug and Alcohol Strategy 2005 – 2008 outlines what the 'Safer Middlesbrough Partnership' intend to do to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour and reduce the harm caused by the misuse of drugs and alcohol.

The Partnership's vision is "to harness the energy and expertise of local agencies, from the public, private and voluntary sectors, to develop a safer and stronger community in which residents, families and business can thrive."

Over recent years the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership has made some excellent progress in tackling crime and disorder. During the year 2005/06 significant crime reductions have been achieved when compared to 2001/02. These include: -

- Theft of motor vehicles down by 47% (-1,030),
- Theft from motor vehicles down by 37% (-1,745),
- Burglary dwellings down by 47% (-1,619),
- Personal robbery down by 47% (-319)

Despite these crime reductions, crime increases have been experienced in the number of criminal damage offences, which have risen by 12% (+591) and assaults, which have risen by 192% (+2,125). It is believed that the increase in the number of assaults is largely as a result of a change in the police crime recording standards rather than a significant increase in the levels of violence. This is supported by the fact that during the Middlesbrough town wide survey, which was carried in 2005, 93% of the 6,178 respondents felt that their neighbourhood was safe. During the same survey anti-social behaviour was highlighted as a big problem by 27% of respondents. The primary anti-social behaviour concerns related to young people hanging around on the streets, vandalism, graffiti, other deliberate damage and drug dealing / misuse.

The Middlesbrough town wide survey also highlighted that 17% of respondents felt that drug dealing and drug using was a big problem in the area where they live. The Safer Middlesbrough Partnership aim to continue the work with the Police and Local Authority to disrupt those who

deal in drugs through enforcement operations but in addition to this they will require all agencies to promote treatment services with users and carers with the intention of reducing the number of problematic drug misurers which is a key factor in reducing the levels of illegal drug supply.

Taking these factors into account the current aim of the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership is to maintain the momentum in respect of reducing crime in the categories where we have been successful. In addition we will focus on coordinating all partners who can contribute to achieving a reduction in criminal damage, assault, which includes domestic violence, and anti-social behaviour. Partner agencies will be required to support the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership Action Plans, which are designed to tackle these issues.

To assist in this the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership has identified the following four strategic priorities: -

- 1. To reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, including domestic violence, domestic burglary, vehicle crime, robbery, and hate crime
- 2. To reassure the public by reducing the fear of crime and anti-social behaviour
- 3. To reduce the harm caused by illegal drugs and alcohol, including substantially increasing the number of drug misusing offenders entering into treatment through the criminal justice system
- 4. To promote community Cohesion and increase voluntary and community engagement, especially amongst those at risk of social exclusion as a means of promoting community safety.

The LAA will enable the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership to achieve these strategic priorities. The outcomes and priorities that have been identified in the LAA reflect a balance between national priorities, LPSA's and the local priorities identified through the Crime and Drugs Audit and through consultation with communities of interest, identity and geography.

To assist in the planning and delivery of the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership priorities the partnership has restructured. The structure is based on three distinct approaches: -

- 1. Active Intelligence Mapping (AIM), which is a weekly meeting responsible for the deployment of partnership resources to tackle priority problems promptly.
- 2. Four geographically based Problem Solving Groups meet on a monthly basis and enable partners to provide a joined up approach to tackle priority repeat problems.
- 3. Strategic theme groups have been formed to tackle town wide approach to specialist themes such as domestic violence, prostitution, race crime and harassment, alcohol, reducing the supply of illegal drugs, reducing crime and reducing anti-social behaviour.

The structure enables the partnership to be more responsive to problems in the short, medium and long term.

RESPECT AGENDA

Middlesbrough adopts a holistic, problem solving interventionist approach to anti-social behaviour, creatively using the full range of education, prevention, enforcement and rehabilitation tools to bring about community respite and cohesion. Middlesbrough wasted no time in recognising the value of the Respect Agenda in this context. Middlesbrough is committed to delivering on the whole of the Government's Respect Action Plan as we believe it will raise the profile and add cohesion to a variety of activities that are already in place and included in our Local Area Agreement. We have integrated the Respect agenda and Action Plan within the priorities and indicators identified in the Local Area Agreement. For example, for young people, key priorities reflect: improving attendance in schools and reducing bullying and discrimination are key priorities for Supporting Children and Learning as well as a key feature in the Respect Action Plan.

Whilst Middlesbrough intends to deliver the whole of the Respect Agenda we have applied to become a Respect Action Area and have prioritised five areas:

- 1. Establishing a Family Intervention Project that challenges and changes the behaviour of the most problematic households perpetrating anti-social behaviour
- 2. Establishing parenting programmes for families at risk of/or behaving anti-socially
- 3. Increasing the quality and quantity of communication with local people through Face the People sessions
- 4. Using the full range of available tools and powers to tackling both the causes and symptoms of antisocial behaviour
- 5. Adopting a Respect Housing Standard by key landlords in the area

PRIORITIES OUTCOMES

The Mayor's Vision for Middlesbrough the Raising Hope Agenda is built on four pillars - one these pillars is a clean safe environment in which people can go about their business without fear of crime and anti social behaviour. In order to make real progress in making Middlesbrough a safer town the Safer Middlesbrough Partnership has identified the following priority outcomes that it wishes to deliver through the local area agreement.
