Councillor Cooper	Question: How many children in MBC care have been safely reunited with their families since 1st of January 2020? Two children have returned home to a parent or a person with parental responsibility for them.	
Councillor Cooke	Question/Request: Please can we be provided with an updated version of the RAG rated document (Immediate Assurance Plan) to compare progress from the original. (This would be beneficial as I don't think we have seen that document since originally presented). The documents sent to Councillors previously gave an overview of progress. Please find attached the updated Immediate Assurance/Recovery plan Item 7 - Recovery plan	
Councillor Wilson	Questions: 1) Re Accusations of bad parenting, (single parent mainly)at the moment. How do social services follow up these accusations? How deep do they go apart from witness statements do they carry out site visits? Do they check the information in a statement is accurate? Any contact made with our MACH (Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub) is considered on a case by case basis whether or not the child lives in a single parent household. If the child's situation does not reach the threshold for social work intervention then family can receive support through 'Early Help'. If the child's situation does reach the threshold for social work intervention then the child can be considered as a Child in Need and receive support accordingly. It the child's situation is one where the s/he is at risk of significant harm now or in the future then a multi-agency strategy meeting is call to plan a child protection enquiry.	

The home will be visited and the child should always be seen and seen alone. Other agencies that know the child such as the health visitor, school nurse, school, GP and the referrer will be contacted for their information and views and opinions. .

2) Re Long term fostering - Are social services after kinship care, if this is not going to happen will long term fostering be an option rather than adoption.

Children need permanence – that is they need to know be in their 'forever homes' as swiftly as possible.

If children cannot live within their birth families every effort will be made to keep them within their extended families and their communities if it is safe to do so.

Both adoption and long-term fostering are forms of permanence and social workers will assess children's needs to inform a decision as to which is the best one for them. Adoption is usually the best form of permanence for younger children.

3) During fostering are relatives allowed access. After adoption are relatives allowed contact?

Contact with relatives will depend on individual children's situations and must be in their best interests. Contact post-adoption is usually indirect contact by exchanging letters between birth family members and the adopters. This may only be once or twice a year.

2. In the briefing to Members, page 2-3 bottom paragraph "Culture, Capacity and COVID". Second line states that, "we have brought in an additional team of auditors ... The results of the audits are shared with staff." I wonder whether the audit results can also be shared with the Members of both Children & YP Social Care & Services Scrutiny Panel and Corporate Parenting Board?

Innovate are providing a managed audit team to Middlesbrough Children's Social Care for a 12 week period which runs from 9 March 2020 until 29 May 2020. Monthly thematic audit reports are produced

which are available for Scrutiny Panel and Corporate Parenting Board. A final review report will be produced and will be available on 1 June 2020. 3. In the second paragraph, it was mentioned that as of 3rd April there were 61 members of staff self-isolating. I acknowledge that it is an extremely difficult time for everyone involved more so, for the 61 staff members and their close families to see through that they are having to go through self-isolating. I am sure all my colleagues would be concerned as much as I am, for all our staff's well-being, in particular for those who are subject to being isolated. I would be grateful if Members can be updated on the 61 staff members' current situation in terms of their well-being and is there any necessary support available for them, if needed? Of the 61 employees in Children's Services that were self-isolating, 28 have since returned to work and 33 remain self-isolating due to shielding. The majority of the affected employees although selfisolating are still able to work remotely from home. All employees are able to access a wide range of wellbeing services through their staff portal. A new Employee Assistance programme was launched on the 01 April and is available to all of our staff 24 hours a day, they provide a telephone counselling service, advice on health and wellbeing issues as well as personal financial information. To ensure staff are informed and remain connected we ask managers to keep in regular contact with staff alongside this the Chief Executive and the Director of Children's Services have been providing regular video updates. Staff have also been engaging with the employee Facebook group which has seen an increase in the number of staff using it, this group allows information on support mechanisms to be shared such as mental health and financial wellbeing support. It also allows general updates to be provided as well as offer a little light relief. Councillor Uddin N/A **Comments:** Councillor Uddin expressed concerns around how the scrutiny process can be effective and how Members can have input into the improvement planning whilst meetings are currently suspended. Written briefings are being provided to all members on a monthly basis until Democratic Services can complete the processes necessary for holding remote meetings. Councillor Rathmell Questions: At Member briefings we have been told that we must all work together to ensure that Children's' Services are kept in-house and are not run under a model in which they are removed from the control of the local authority. a) Please provide me details with the SWOT (or similar), cost-benefit or any similar analysis that was used in making this decision.

The belief that the responsibility for providing the best possible services to the children of Middlesbrough should rest with the democratically elected representatives of the town was not based upon a cost benefit analysis. It was informed by a conviction that it was better for local people to take the responsibility for improving these services to our own children than to outsource this responsibility to a third party who would not be accountable to the people of Middlesbrough.

b) Please provide details of who was shown the analysis and the dates this information was shared.

There was no analysis to be shared.

- 5) How many 'vulnerable' children are:
 - a) still attending school and how many are at home?
 - b) What checks are made on those 'vulnerable' children who are not attending school?

All vulnerable children whether they attend school or at home have been subject to an EHCP review of a safety plan carried out by a social worker working with school and other agencies to appraise the risk posed to the young person.

- 6) How many 'at risk' children are:
 - a) still attending school and how many are at home?
 - b) What checks are made on those 'at risk' children who are not attending school?

- 7) How many vulnerable children, eligible for free school meals, are still having free school meals?
 - a) What process are schools using to make free school meals available to pupils?
 - b) Are there any schools in which parents are expected to collect the free school meals from the school? If so, what it the Council's position on this?

The government have developed the national voucher scheme which means eligible families will receive a £15 voucher for each child. The administration of the scheme is through schools as they are best placed to know who their eligible families are and will be ensuring that they receive FSM provision. The Council is communicating to the Regional Schools Commissioner, regional councils and schools daily to ensure everyone remains up to date with latest policies and practice. Access to additional support is available via the Coronavirus pages on the council website which provide information in community hubs etc. and is also in leaflets promoting welfare and support published in 17 languages which are being handed out in specific wards by Street Wardens.
