1. Summary of Applications:

The purpose of this report is to enable Members to consider an application for a review of the premises licence for Lifestyle Express, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough made by Cleveland Police on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the prevention of public nuisance.

Cleveland Police state that high levels of street drinking, anti-social behaviour, nuisance, disorder and crime in the local area are linked to the sale of cheap, high ABV alcohol from the premises. Cleveland Police also have concerns about the management of the premises and the lack of compliance with the conditions of the premises licence.

A copy of the application from Cleveland Police and additional documentation in support of their application is attached at **Appendix 2**.

Under Regulation 11 of the Licensing Act (Hearings) Regulations 2005 the time limit for this hearing to take place has been extended as the Council considered it is in the public interest and agreed by the Applicant to do so in order to enable the parties to the hearing to be present and to convene a panel of members following the Annual General Meeting, training and summer recess.

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2. Legislation

The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Licensing Authority to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance
- The Protection of Children from Harm

The Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Licensing Policy and any guidance issued by the Secretary of State.

3. Consultation on review application

The premises licence holder, any responsible authority or any other person are permitted to make representations in respect of the review application following publication of a notice.

In response to the consultation, on 15 August 2022, a representation was received from the Licensing Authority acting in it's role as a Responsible Authority. A copy of the representation which is on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the prevention of public nuisance is attached at **Appendix 3**.

On 19 August 2022 a representation was received from the Responsible Authority for Public Health supporting the application on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm. A copy of the representation is attached at **Appendix 4.**

On 19 August 2022 a representation was received from Nicola Battista, the director of a neighbouring business, Guido Hair Limited supporting the application on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance. A copy of the representation is attached at **Appendix 5**.

On 24 August 2022 a representation was received from Nicola Kenny, a Neighbourhood Safety Officer employed by Middlesbrough Council supporting the application on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder. A copy of this representation is attached at **Appendix 6.**

On 24 August 2022 a representation was received from the Newport Ward Councillor, Chris Cook supporting the application on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance. A copy of this representation is attached at **Appendix 7**.

4. Background

The Lifestyle Express store, is a busy convenience store situated on a busy residential road with a mixture of residential and business premises. The area has historically been part of the Council's Cumulative Impact Area which has lapsed but the Council are seeking to reinstate in the very near future. A location plan is attached at **Appendix 8.**

The premises have had the benefit of a premises licence since 14 April 2009 and Mr Abuzar Naveed has been the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor since that time.

- f. Alternatively, Members may consider that it is not necessary to take any of the above steps and may issue an informal warning and/or or recommend improvement within a certain time period.

Any party to the hearing who may be aggrieved by the decision taken by the Licensing Sub-Committee would have a right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

Mandatory conditions in accordance with Section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003:

Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol:

- (i) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
- (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (ii) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Effective from 1 October 2010

- (1) The premise licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

The Lifestyle Express store, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough is a busy convenience store situated on a busy residential road with a mixture of residential and business premises. The area has historically been part of the council's Cumulative Impact Area (CIA) which has lapsed but the council are seeking to reinstate in the very near future and this area will again be part of this for very good reason.

During 2019/2020 we had several meetings with the Designated Premise Supervisor (DPS) Mr Naveed, regarding on going issues of street drinking, disorder and crime which were linked to the sale of alcohol from the premise. Mr Naveed agreed to an Action Plan which was in full flow with positive results as of January 2020 until the pandemic hit causing lockdowns and restrictions.

After the lifting of restrictions the store fully re-opened and Mr Naveed handed the reigns over to Mr Iqbal, although Mr Naveed remains on the licence as the named DPS. The incidents have again slowly increased, with the premise again selling stronger cans of beer, cider and lager and selling them as individual cans at a cost of between 99p and £1.20 a can.

The incidents have reached a crescendo with street drinking, Anti-social behaviour and nuisance being a daily occurrence and the familiar black cans of cheap high ABV cider being ever present. Street Enforcement and the Neighbourhood Police team have both taken steps to deal with the issues and have visited the store on a number of occasions.

Police Licensing along with Public Health visited the premise on Friday 15th July 2022. On arrival we immediately saw two females arguing outside the shop, the arguing was becoming more intense and the situation was escalating. We had to step in to put a stop to the incident. As the situation was calming and the females were walking away a male across the road drinking from a Black can began to shout across the road at the officers. I approached the male who was drinking a can of Knights cider which is sold from the store we were attending and he had another can of the same drink next to him. Knights is a high ABV (8.4% ABV) and low cost (£1.20 a can sold as single cans). He was clearly drunk, his eyes glazed and his speech slurred. The male was spoken and told to leave the area. These types of incidents are not unusual in this area. On entering the store and looking around we saw Perry products for sale on the shelves (a breach

On entering the store and looking around we saw Perry products for sale on the shelves (a breach of the premise licence conditions), high ABV single cans of cider making up a large portion of the alcohol for sale, and the majority of litre plus bottles of cider were again high ABV. Mr Iqbal was serving and watching over the store and when asked confirmed that he was in charge and that he had been running the business since last year. He was asked why Mr Naveed was still named as DPS on the licence, but Mr Iqbal had no satisfactory answer. As we were of the opinion that there was no DPS in day to day control of the premises Mt Iqbal was asked to refrain from the sale of alcohol until the matter was resolved, removing alcohol from floor displays, covering the refrigerated alcohol and refusing any further requests for sale. Mr Iqbal agreed to this and was seen to refuse the next few customers' service of alcohol while we were there.

Police Licensing, Public Health, Council Licensing and Street Enforcement officers attended the store again on Tuesday 19th July 2022 at 13:15 hours. Mr Iqbal was again in attendance but Mr Naveed was also there serving from behind the counter. Mr Naveed stated he was there as DPS and when asked considered that he was in day to day control of the premises. Mr Naveed was asked to demonstrate the CCTV, he stated that there had been some problems with the CCTV. When he tried to go back to show us footage from previous days it was found that CCTV was only on from that day and no previous CCTV had been recorded. This was despite our visit on Friday 15th July and the council's visit on Monday 18th July when Mr Iqbal had been asked about the CCTV on both occasions. Mr Naveed was then asked to produce Training records, the incident book and the refusals book. Mr Naveed produced three books which all looked brand new, in fact the training record had a price label on it which looked new. There were entries in the training book and the refusals log but they all looked to be in the same pen and by the same person. The books were seized as evidence.

Mr Naveed attended the Civic Centre, Middlesbrough for a meeting with responsible authorities regarding the issues at Lifestyle Express. He explained that for the past two weeks he had been
there on the Monday of both for a maximum of two hours and estimated his regular attendance as
four hours a week which I do not believe fulfils his obligation of day to day running of the
premise. He does not have responsibility for stock, staff wages, or other managerial duties and
holds down a part time job elsewhere. He was unwilling to acknowledge the issues in the area and could not see the part the store played in the problems. He also said that on re-opening after the
COVID restrictions he did not continue with the Action Plan that had been agreed in January 2020
which he did agree probably did not help.
Unfortunately the running of the premise does not instil us with the confidence that matters could
be put right in the short term, leading to further disruption for the residents and possible ASB and
disorder. With their continued sale of single can high strength alcohol and large bottles of high ABV white cider we believe that the Licensing Objectives as a consequence are and will continue
to be undermined.

staff wages, or other managerial duties and holds down a part time job elsewhere. He was unwilling to acknowledge the issues in the area and could not see the part the store played in the problems. He also said that on re-opening after the COVID restrictions he did not continue with the Action Plan that had been agreed in January 2020 which he did agree probably did not help.

We have since received an application to vary the Designated Premises Supervisor for the premises which we have objected to awaiting the outcome of this review hearing.

A review of any premises licence is the last resort, and we will always strive to met the premises needs in other ways before resorting to this however the familiar cycle of issues with the premises have forced our hands. Unfortunately, the running of the premise does not instil us with the confidence that matters could be put right in the short term, leading to further disruption for the residents and possible ASB and disorder. With their continued sale of single can high strength alcohol and large bottles of high ABV white cider we believe that the Licensing Objectives as a consequence are and will continue to be undermined.

failed to uphold three of the four of the Licensing Objectives, namely Crime & Disorder, Prevention of Public Nuisance, and Public Safety.

The Lifestyle Express store, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough is a busy convenience store situated on a busy residential road with a mixture of residential and business premises. The area has historically been part of the council's Cumulative Impact Area (CIA) which has lapsed but the council are seeking to reinstate in the very near future and this area will again be part of this for very good reason.

During 2019/2020 we had several meetings with the Designated Premise Supervisor (DPS) Mr Naveed, regarding on going issues of street drinking, disorder and crime which were linked to the sale of alcohol from the premise. Mr Naveed agreed to an Action Plan which was in full flow with positive results as of January 2020 until the pandemic hit causing lockdowns and restrictions.

After the lifting of restrictions, the store fully re-opened and Mr Naveed handed the reigns over to Mr Iqbal, although Mr Naveed remains on the licence as the named DPS. The incidents have again slowly increased, with the premise again selling stronger cans of beer, cider and lager and selling them as individual cans at a cost of between 99p and £1.20 a can.

The incidents have reached a crescendo with street drinking, Anti-social behaviour and nuisance being a daily occurrence and the familiar black cans of cheap high ABV cider being

ever present. Street Enforcement and the Neighbourhood Police team have both taken steps to deal with the issues and have visited the store on a number of occasions.

Police Licensing along with Public Health visited the premise on Friday 15th July 2022. On arrival we immediately saw two females arguing outside the shop, the arguing was becoming more intense, and the situation was escalating. We had to step in to put a stop to the incident. As the situation was calming and the females were walking away a male across the road drinking from a Black can began to shout across the road at the officers. I approached the male who was drinking a can of Knights cider which is sold from the store we were attending, and he had another can of the same drink next to him. Knights is a high ABV (8.4% ABV) and low cost (£1.20 a can sold as single cans). He was clearly drunk, his eyes glazed, and his speech slurred. The male was spoken and told to leave the area. These types of incidents are not unusual in this area.

On entering the store and looking around we saw Perry products for sale on the shelves (a breach of the premise licence conditions), high ABV single cans of cider making up a large portion of the alcohol for sale, and the majority of litre plus bottles of cider were again high ABV. Mr Iqbal was serving and watching over the store and when asked confirmed that he was in charge and that he had been running the business since last year. He was asked why Mr Naveed was still named as DPS on the licence, but Mr Iqbal had no satisfactory answer. As we were of the opinion that there was no DPS in day-to-day control of the premises Mt Iqbal was asked to refrain from the sale of alcohol until the matter was resolved, removing alcohol from floor displays, covering the refrigerated alcohol and refusing any further

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requests for sale. Mr Iqbal agreed to this and was seen to refuse the next few customers' service of alcohol while we were there.

Police Licensing, Public Health, Council Licensing and Street Enforcement officers attended the store again on Tuesday 19th July 2022 at 13:15 hours. Mr Iqbal was again in attendance, but Mr Naveed was also there serving from behind the counter. Mr Naveed stated he was there as DPS and when asked considered that he was in day-to-day control of the premises. Mr Naveed was asked to demonstrate the CCTV, he stated that there had been some problems with the CCTV. When he tried to go back to show us footage from previous days it was found that CCTV was only on from that day and no previous CCTV had been recorded. This was despite our visit on Friday 15th July and the council's visit on Monday 18th July when Mr Iqbal had been asked about the CCTV on both occasions. Mr Naveed was then asked to produce Training records, the incident book and the refusals book. Mr Naveed produced three books which all looked brand new, in fact the training record had a price label on it which looked new. There were entries in the training book and the refusals log, but they all looked to be in the same pen and by the same person. The books were seized as evidence.

Mr Naveed attended the Civic Centre, Middlesbrough for a meeting with responsible authorities regarding the issues at Lifestyle Express. He explained that for the past two weeks he had been there on the Monday of both for a maximum of two hours and estimated his regular attendance as four hours a week which I do not believe fulfils his obligation of day to day running of the premise. He does not have responsibility for stock, staff wages, or other managerial duties and holds down a part time job elsewhere. He was unwilling to

acknowledge the issues in the area and could not see the part the store played in the problems. He also said that on re-opening after the COVID restrictions he did not continue with the Action Plan that had been agreed in January 2020 which he did agree probably did not help.

We have since received an application to vary the Designated Premises Supervisor for the premises which we have objected to awaiting the outcome of this review hearing.

A review of any premises licence is the last resort, and we will always strive to met the premises needs in other ways before resorting to this however the familiar cycle of issues with the premises have forced our hands. Unfortunately, the running of the premise does not instil us with the confidence that matters could be put right in the short term, leading to further disruption for the residents and possible ASB and disorder. With their continued sale of single can high strength alcohol and large bottles of high ABV white cider we believe that the Licensing Objectives as a consequence are and will continue to be undermined.

As the representative of the Responsible Authority for Middlesbrough Council Licensing Department, I make this representation in support of the Review Application made by Cleveland Police on the grounds of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety and Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The premises is situated in Middlesbrough Town Centre which has a high density of licensed premises and already suffers from high levels of alcohol related crime and disorder and anti-social behaviour.

For a number of years the Town Centre has been included in an area covered by Cumulative Impact Policies for both On and Off Licence Premises. Whilst these policies have lapsed there is a current review ongoing of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy. Evidence has been provided to the Council which shows that there are still high levels of alcohol related crime and disorder and anti social behaviour within the Town Centre and a draft Statement of Licensing Policy is currently being prepared for consultation which will recommend maintaining the Cumulative Impact Policy for the Town Centre area for both On and Off Licence Premises.

On 19 July 2022 I visited the premises with Reece Littlewood, Licensing Enforcement Officer and Fiona Helyer, Public Health Officer following concerns raised by Mrs Helyer and Cleveland Police that there was no Designated Premises Supervisor or Personal Licence holder in place at the premises to authorise the sale of alcohol.

We entered the premises and spoke to Zafar Iqbal, the new owner of the business and advised that if there was no Designated Premises Licence holder in place he should not be selling alcohol. Mr Iqbal stated that he did not speak very good English and handed me his mobile phone and asked me to speak to a female called Parveen Iqbal, who I understand is Mr Iqbal's wife. Mrs Iqbal explained that there had been a misunderstanding and that Abuzar Naveed was still the Designated Premises Supervisor at the premises and visited the shop occasionally.

I then began to carry out a check of the premises licence conditions and found a number of breaches of the premises licence conditions and areas of concern including –

- There were a number of perry products on sale Mr Iqbal did not appear to know there was a condition on the premises licence prohibiting the sale of such products.
- There was no refusal book in operation Mr Iqbal initially stated that this book had been taken away by a Trading Standards Officer following a visit on 30 May 2022, however, this was confirmed later by Trading Standards not to be the case. He subsequently produced a hard bound book detailing only 3 entries for refusal of alcohol sales since June 2022, 2 refusals for alcohol and 1 for cigarettes – all for not having ID (exhibit TH1).
- In relation to the condition concerning staff training Mr Iqbal did not appear to have any knowledge of which members of staff had been trained or how often the training took place. He was also not aware whether there were any training records for staff, however, one of the members of staff, Samyuhta Gopal advised that he had undertaken training which had included underage sales, appropriate identification and refusals and that this had been done by Parveen Iqbal.
- Mr Iqbal was unable to access the CCTV system for the premises to be able to show that the appropriate footage was being retained.

I advised Mr Iqbal that because of my concerns I needed to speak with Abuzar Naveed, the Designated Premises Supervisor. Mr Iqbal stated that he did not have a contact

number for Abuzar Naveed but only had a contact number for Mr Naveed's sister. Shortly afterwards I spoke with Abuzar Naveed on the telephone. He advised that he was the Designated Premises Supervisor at the premises and that he did visit the shop at least 2 times a week and that he had visited at 3pm the day before. He stated that although he was the current Premises Licence holder and Designated Premises Supervisor he had been meaning to transfer the Premises Licence to Mr Iqbal for some time – approximately 4 or 5 months but had not got around to completing the transfer.

Whilst carrying out the visit I also noticed a large selection of cheap, high strength beers and ciders on sale at the premises. This is the type of alcohol which is favoured by alcohol dependent street drinkers. I understand that the area in the immediate vicinity of these premises suffers from significant issues with street drinker.

The products on sale included -

Frosty Jacks Cider - 7.5% abv

White Storm White Cider - 7.5% abv

Single Cans of Kestrel Super Strength Larger – 9% abv

Single Cans of Oranjeboom Strong Beer – 7.5% abv

During the time we were present at the premises, approximately 30 minutes, I witnessed approximately 5 or 6 highly intoxicated customers enter the premises attempting to buy alcohol including 2 customers who made enquiries about buying single cans of lager. On each occasion the sales were refused by Mr Iqbal. Given that he had made these 5 or 6 refusals within the 30 minute period we were present I would have expected there to be far more that the 3 refusals entered in the refusals register since June 2022.


It is also noted that none of the 3 refusals in June 2022 were as a result of customers being drunk.

It is clear from concerns raised to the Council by residents and other businesses in the area that this area of Town already suffers from high levels of alcohol related crime and anti social behaviour and instances of street drinking.

It remains my opinion that poor management of these premises, including a number of breaches of licence conditions, is significantly contributing to the undermining the Crime and Disorder, Public Safety and Public Nuisance licensing objectives.

This representation is made in relation to the crime and disorder, public safety, public nuisance and protection of children from harm licensing objectives. There are a number of areas of concern regarding these premises including whether or not the person named on the licence as the designated premises supervisor is indeed in day to day control of the premises and authorising the sale of alcohol.

The operator of the premises has failed to comply with the law in relation to Licensing Act 2003 and they have failed to comply with licensing conditions which are in place to promote the licensing objectives.

There are also concerns around the availability and sale of cheap strong alcohol to those that are vulnerable and the high levels of alcohol related crime and ASB that is being reported in and around the area that these premises are situated.

As the representative of the Responsible Authority for Public Health, I make this representation against this Premises Licence application on the grounds of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance and Protection of Children from Harm.

This representation is made to support the review application made by the Police that this licensed premises is being operated in such a manner which presents a risk to the safety of the public and does not support the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm licensing

objectives.

This store is situated in Newport ward, one of the most deprived areas in Middlesbrough, with high unemployment rates, poor education attainments and poor standards of living, all of which contribute to poor health and wellbeing within families and communities.

Alcohol related crime and poor health standards are visible in this area, with a high density of licensed premises, high levels of alcohol related crime and anti-social behaviour and some of the cheapest alcohol being made readily available for our most vulnerable members of society.

Historically, Newport ward was named within Middlesbrough Council's cumulative impact policy for off licensed premises which lapsed in March 2022. This policy will be reviewed in the near future and evidence is being compiled for Newport ward to be included in any future cumulative impact policy that is agreed and implemented.

Between November 2019 and January 2020 several meetings were held between Police, Public Health, Licensing and Neighbourhood Safety Officers with the named Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Abuzar Naveed. These meetings were to discuss a number of complaints that had been received from residents and local businesses involving alcohol related crime and disorder, anti-social behaviour, street drinking and harassment caused to those living or visiting businesses in close proximity to the premises.

In November 2019 an action plan was put in place in an attempt to resolve the issues reported which all parties present at the meeting agreed to. Exhibit Ref FMH/1.

The action plan detailed several points for action that needed to be completed by Mr Naveed in hope that such would stop and prevent the issues experienced in the area from reoccurring. The actions within the plan were monitored by Officers and within a number of weeks there was a significant reduction in the number of complaints being received and in alcohol related crime and ASB being reported in the area.

Meetings with all parties concerned continued, the last one being held in January 2020. Due to the Covid pandemic these premises closed its doors for business and remained closed, opening its doors again between April and August 2021.

In August 2021 Public Health representatives attended the premises to carry out the alcohol survey that had been completed similarly over the past few years. Exhibit ref FMH/2. At this time a male named Mr Zafar Iqbal presented himself as the new premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor, advising officers that he had taken over the lease for the premises and that he was now in day to day control of the premises.

A conversation took place between Public Health Officers and Mr Iqbal around the issues and concerns that had been experienced in the area prior to the Pandemic. Mr Iqbal reassured Officers that alcohol sales would not be the domineering factor in his business

and that his concentration would be around the sales of groceries and household goods.

Following a number of further complaints received more recently from the Council's neighbourhood safety team, again around alcohol related crime and anti-social behaviour including street drinking and harassment, alarm and distress caused to residents and business owners, I attended the premises on Friday 15 July 2022 in company with PC Thorpe from Cleveland Police and Nicola Kenny, a Middlesbrough Council Neighbourhood Safety Officer.

Whilst waiting for officers to arrive at the premises, people were observed drinking outside of residential premises, directly opposite the shop. They were all intoxicated, talking loudly, swearing and acting in a drunken manner. Officers also witnessed an incident involving a drunken female member of this group who approached a lone female walking in the street. The drunken female began to shout, waving her arms in the air before pushing the female and accusing her of stealing from her. This incident was diffused by Police Officers in attendance resulting in the street drinkers being dispersed.

Officers attended the premises and spoke to Mr Iqbal who advised once again that he was the owner of the business, had taken on the lease for the premises and was paying the rent. He confirmed that Mr Abuzar Naveed, the person named on the premises licence as the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor was no longer in day to day control of the premises and that it was he who was authorising the sale of alcohol.

Alcohol being sold from the premises at the time included the sale of Perry items. A condition of the premises licence includes that 'No Perry will be stocked or sold from the premises at any time'. Displaying and selling such products from the premises is a clear breach of licensing conditions.

There were other products of note that would be deemed as attractive to those who are vulnerable through alcohol dependency. These included a number of strong white ciders and super strength products that were being sold for as little as £1.00 per 500ml can. Whilst at the premises a number of people entered the store purchasing such products. The majority of these people were intoxicated and vulnerable due to their alcohol dependency.

Whilst at the premises a request was made to view CCTV footage to check that the condition was being complied with. Mr Iqbal was unable to demonstrate this as he was unable to operate the system.

As a result of information received, Mr Iqbal was advised to stop selling alcohol from the premises as it was suspected that there was no designated premises supervisor in place authorising the sale of such products.

Checks were later made with the Council's Licensing team and it was confirmed that a transfer application had not been received by the licensing authority transferring the premises licence to Mr Iqbal, nor had there been an application to vary the Designated

Premises Supervisor.

On Tuesday 19 July 2022 officers from Middlesbrough Council's Licensing and Public Health attended the premises to carry out a full licensing inspection to ensure that all conditions of the premises licence were being complied with. Officers were unable to establish whether the CCTV system was recording and retaining footage as Mr Iqbal and other staff where unable to demonstrate this once again.

During the visit Officers where shown copies of the refusals book, incident log and staff training records. Photographs were taken by officers at the time to evidence what had been produced as the training records were limited, there were no incidents recorded in the incident book and there was limited refusal entries. A number of photos were also taken of the alcohol products containing high ABV content on sale at the time (Exhibit ref FMH/3).

Whilst at the premises I contacted Mr Naveed by telephone and held a brief conversation with him before passing the telephone to Tim Hodgkinson, Middlesbrough Council's Licensing Manager. Mr Naveed told me that he was still the named Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor and that he was still in day to day control of the premises.

Several customers, all of whom were intoxicated entered the store while officers were present, asking for the cheap cans of white cider. Mr Iqbal advised them that he was no longer selling them. One male was carrying a lit cigarette and was asked to put it out. He began asking questions and started to express his opinion, raising his voice about not being able to buy the cans of cider that he wanted.

On Wednesday 20 July 2022 Police, Licensing and Public Health officers attended the premises and met Mr Naveed, Mr Iqbal was also present. During this visit to the premises it was identified that the refusals log and staff training records had been amended. Photographs were taken of the amendments (exhibit FMH/4) and the books/documents were later seized by Police. Both Mr Naveed and Mr Iqbal were unable to demonstrate that the CCTV was recording and retaining evidence. Mr Naveed advised that there had been a power cut days earlier but was unable to provide any details of the work that had been carried out on the CCTV system.

Once again there was several vulnerable people coming in to the store, all of whom were intoxicated and wanting to purchase the cheap cans of white cider. A female known to neighbour safety officers as being alcohol dependant purchased a bottle of wine instead.

Later the same day Mr Naveed at Council Offices at Civic Centre, Middlesbrough where he met with Police, Licensing, Public Health and Neighbour Hood Safety Officers. During the meeting Mr Naveed confirmed that he no longer held the lease for the business at 22-24 Princes Road and that Mr Iqbal had taken the lease over April 2021. He confirmed that he did not manage or pay the staff working at the premises nor did he order and pay for any stock. He advised that he attended the premises approximately twice a week for a period of 1-2 hours to make sure that everything was in order. He also advised that he

currently works a part time job elsewhere.

A copy of the lease was requested and has since been received. It confirms that Mr Zafar Iqbal is named as the lease holder for the premises. Mr Naveed advised that he had agreed to remain on the premises licence as the named premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor until a transfer application was completed.

The Licensing Act clearly sets out the role of a designated premises supervisor (DPS) and states that the DPS is the person who has day-to-day responsibility for the running of the business. The person chosen to be designated premises supervisor (DPS) will act as primary contact for local government and the police. They must understand the social issues and potential problems associated with the sale of alcohol, and also have a good understanding of the business itself.

There are concerns around whether Mr Naveed is in day to day control due to the lack of presence, authority and control that he has displayed at the premises and also his lack of knowledge and understanding of the issues surrounding the premises. The breaches of licensing conditions that have been identified are also of concern. Illegality in one area of the law may demonstrate a willingness to contravene other areas of legislation including the sale of alcohol to drunken/vulnerable people.

Responsibility in the operation of a licensed premises and the sale of alcohol from a licensed premises is paramount in this ward. It is the responsibility of the Premises Licence Holders/Designated Premises Supervisors and staff working at the premises to ensure that they uphold the licensing objectives. Conditions attached to the Premises Licence must be complied with at all times as this gives the assurance that the law is complied with, the licensing objectives are being promoted and any risks to members of the public are reduced.

Given the number of complaints received from residents and nearby businesses it is apparent that there is a clear lack of control at the premises which has resulted in the licensing objectives, namely crime and disorder, public safety, prevention of public nuisance and protection of children from harm being undermined.

This representation is made to support the review application made by the Police to ensure that this licensed premise does not continue to operate in such a manner which presents a risk to the safety of the public and undermines the licensing objectives.

Further evidence will be submitted prior to any future licensing-sub committee hearing


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
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




































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Additional Evidence presented by Middlesbrough Council, Responsible Authority for health, against the application for a premises licence in respect of premises situated at 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough the Licensing Act 2003

Further to the representation and evidence submitted on behalf of Middlesbrough Council's Public Health on 19 August 2022 in respect of The Princes Road Convenience Store I wish to add the following:

The impact of alcohol misuse is broad, often hidden and adversely affects individuals, families and communities in many ways, with the harm being disproportionately greater for vulnerable and disadvantaged communities. It impacts upon a number of Council services as well as the NHS, Police, Criminal Justice System, Education, Voluntary and Community sector.

The cost of alcohol misuse was estimated to cost the economy in England up to £25 billion per year and for Middlesbrough a total of £56.5 million which included costs relating to health, social care, crime and licensing. It costs the NHS over £3.5 Billion year.

More than 9 million people in England drink more than the recommended daily limits. 24.3% adults in Middlesbrough drink more than 14 units alcohol week, with 19.9% adults identified as binge drinking.

People in Middlesbrough are more likely to die of alcohol related conditions or specific reasons compared to England or the region.

In 2020, Middlesbrough had an alcohol-related mortality rate per 100,000 of 55.9 per 100,000 which was higher than the North East rate of 49 per 100,000, significantly higher than the England rate of 37.8 and the 6th highest nationally. The rate of hospital admissions for alcohol-related conditions in 2020/21 was also significantly higher in Middlesbrough compared to England with a rate of 1,957 per 100,000 compared to 1,500 nationally.

The rate of admission episodes for alcohol-specific conditions in under 18s for the period 2018/19 – 20/21 was 35.6 per 100,000, higher than the England rate of 29.3 per 100,000.

Middlesbrough has the second highest rate in the North East for the number of premises licensed to sell alcohol per square kilometre with a rate of 7.7, significantly higher than the England rate of 1.3.

This store is situated in Newport ward, one of the most deprived areas in Middlesbrough, with high unemployment rates, poor education attainments and poor



standards of living, all of which contribute to poor health and wellbeing within families and communities. It is licensed for the off sale of alcohol from 7am – 10pm seven days a week.

Alcohol related crime and poor health standards are visible in this area, with a high density of licensed premises, high levels of alcohol related crime and anti-social behaviour and some of the cheapest alcohol being made readily available for our most vulnerable members of society.

Historically, Newport ward was named within Middlesbrough Council's cumulative impact policy for off licensed premises which lapsed in March 2022. This policy is being reviewed and evidence is being compiled for Newport ward to be included in any future cumulative impact policy that is agreed and implemented.

Newport ward remains one of the most deprived wards in Middlesbrough that has suffered over a number of years and continues to do. The facts are that this area still has a high density of licensed premises, high levels of alcohol related crime and disorder and anti-social behaviour and a high prevalence of alcohol related harm.

The following table shows the distribution of all licensed premises and off licensed premises in Middlesbrough. Both Newport and Central wards, highlighted in yellow are adjoining wards and have the highest number of off licensed premises out of the 20 wards in Middlesbrough.

Newport has the 2nd highest concentration of licensed premises. The adjoining Central ward has the highest concentration of licensed premises including on/off licences, pubs/clubs, restaurants, hotels and late night refreshment venues. The number of licensed premises in both Newport and adjoining Central ward equates to nearly 50% of all licensed premises in Middlesbrough.



The following table shows alcohol related anti-social behaviour for all 20 ward areas in Middlesbrough over a 3 year period from 2018/2019/2020. Newport ward, which borders Central ward, had the second highest levels recorded. Central ward had the highest levels of alcohol related Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) across the three years.

Alcohol related crime and ASB has a significant impact on our NHS services including local A&E departments.

The Hospital Intervention Liaison Team (HILT) sits within Accident and Emergency unit James Cook Hospital to assess those patients accessing the hospital with drug and/or alcohol issues. They engage, support and make referrals into community services where needed.

Between April 21 and March 2022 HILT assessed 819 patients in total from the Middlesbrough area.



The following table shows the number of patients living in both Newport and Central wards of Middlesbrough (postcode starting with TS1) that were assessed by HILT in JCUH during this period.

Throughout 2020 and to date there has been an alarming rise in the numbers of people choosing to drink at home during the Covid-19 pandemic.

An alcohol study completed in 2021 by Teesside Universities researchers with Middlesbrough residents across all ward areas, provides evidence that people in Middlesbrough are drinking more at home due to the pressures and anxiety brought on by the Covid-19 pandemic, including, financial pressures, unemployment, social isolation and daily routines being disrupted. For whatever reason, it is believed that alcohol in many of these cases was being used as a coping mechanism.

Between February and September 2020 deaths caused by alcohol hit a new record high in England and Wales and high-risk drinking increased by almost 90%. It was estimated there were 8 million people drinking at higher risk levels, with alcohol treatment services struggling to cope.

Between 1 May 2020 and 18 November 2020 there were 9 deaths recorded in Middlesbrough where alcohol had been a contributing factor. A further 43 drug related deaths were recorded between 8 January 2021 – 14 April 2022 in Middlesbrough, where alcohol was the sole or additional contributing factor. Almost 50% (19 deaths) were recorded from both Newport and Central wards.

- A proportion of individuals were alone in a property at time of death
- These deaths occurred during a period were pubs have been closed.
- The number of arrests of some individuals also indicate a potentially different user group/cohort.
- Cocaine or prescription medicines were often quoted alongside alcohol use.
 It's rare that a drug related death has a single substance detected so it is likely alcohol has been taken alongside other drugs.

In 2021 Middlesbrough Council's Alcohol and Substance Misuse treatment services were working with approximately 1,360 clients. During 2020 there was a steady increase in the numbers accessing services for the following reasons:



- Those that had been abstinent for a number of years had relapsed
- Those using opioids/non opioids where alcohol had also become a problem
- Those processed through the Criminal Justice System for alcohol related crime and issued an Alcohol Treatment Referral (ATR).

A review of alcohol treatment and recovery services in Middlesbrough has been completed and a new integrated service continues to provide specialist treatment and aftercare for those suffering with alcohol dependency whilst focusing around the hidden harms often associated with alcohol consumption including domestic abuse and homelessness.

Over the past few years there has been an increase in the levels of alcohol related domestic abuse right across the UK. Such incidents often result in injury which not only impacts on a person's physical health but can have a long lasting impact on mental health and wellbeing, including for those who are witness to such incidents of violence.

Alcohol is readily available in Middlesbrough and can be purchased from a number of different alcohol premises including off licences, supermarkets and premises offering alcohol delivery services making it easy for those who are vulnerable and suffering with alcohol addiction to access.

Survey work carried out in Middlesbrough 2015/16 found that alcohol was being sold as cheaply as 13p/unit. A more recent survey completed in 2021/22 shows a slight rise, increasing the unit cost to 18p.

This increase falls in line with a number of factors including; the introduction of the cumulative impact policy in 2016 for off licensed premises, reviewing licenses of problematic premises, working alongside retailers to promote responsible retailing and imposing or agreeing conditions that help to limit the sales of cheap, strong alcohol products especially in areas that suffer from high levels of alcohol related crime and disorder, anti-social behaviour and health harms.

Responsibility in the operation of a licensed premises and the sale of alcohol are paramount. It is imperative that staff in control of any licensed premises act responsibly to ensure that their premises manage the sale of alcohol, their customers and any vulnerability issues accordingly.



In our opinion the applicant has failed to demonstrate this and has undermined the licensing objectives.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am a director of Guido's Hair Salon situated at 13 & 20 Princes Road. Guido's has been at this address since 1973, it is a well-established, reputable and very well known in Teesside, our clients come from all areas of Teesside as well as many that travel here from out the area.

Princes Road has dramatically declined since the Homeless hub/cafe opened at 11 Princes Road. The members of the public which this cafe attracts are not from the local area and they are definitely not homeless after been in the cafe they are then purchasing cheap alcohol and are congregating outside the cafe all day, in groups, intoxicated, drug and drink fuelled, swearing, fighting, begging to members of the public, violent, urinating on people's properties/ premises, standing in the middle of the road traffic having to stop, sitting on people's doorsteps, exposing themselves after urinating. and many times, collapsing or passing out.

The Premier Store at 22/24 Princes Road supplies alcohol to these people even when they are already intoxicated, they buy cheap, high strength alcohol from the shop and then stand or sit in the busy street all day visibly holding the cans, shouting, swearing and approaching terrified members of the public begging for money.

I have been approached by my clients asking what is getting done about this? telling me they feel intimidated seeing and walking by these alcohol fuelled people. They are scared to park their car too far from the salon as they are scared to walk down the street. We have children, senior citizens, clients with special needs and disabilities they don't feel safe. Our clients as well as students, members of the public are being harassed which happens on a daily basis.

My business among others in the area are extremely affected by these people the pressure and stress it causes to business owners as well as the negative impact on the business as a whole is heart-breaking.

I have reported incidents to the police many times and had resorted to putting a complaint to the Cleveland Police.

I have had meetings with Andy Preston about the issues which he has tried to put measures in place. I have asked to have a discussion with Andy Macdonald which I am still waiting for a phone call after 2 attempts trying.

I have spoken with Middlesbrough council about all issues. Street wardens are aware of the problems however they feel intimidated.

The local councillors are aware and notify the relevant persons in meetings or emails.

Through speaking to all these professionals, it is clear that they try but to no avail. I have found out from Street Wardens and a PCSO that they can't take alcohol from them as they are alcohol dependant, which contradicts the whole situation we have on this road.

I object to the licence on the grounds of crime and disorder and anti-social behaviour caused by the customers of the premises at 22/24 Princes Road.

I am in the process of preparing a petition for residents/businesses (Bentley Lounge, Housams, Budgens and Ice Stone to name a few) and clients to sign many have raised their concerns due to the homeless cafe customers purchasing alcohol and causing anti-social behaviour on a daily basis to which we all agree, and most of the professionals who I have mentioned above are all in agreeance this homeless cafe should be in a more suitable location away from a community setting as this would suit the people that use it too. Both these premises are impacting businesses and putting a huge strain on the community and the professionals (Council, Police and Ambulance).

Please find below additional Public Health Representation in respect on The Premier Shop, 22 – 24 Princes Road, Newport.

I am a Neighbour Safety Officer for Middlesbrough Council (Specifically for Selective Landlord Licensing – Public Protection) and I make this representation on behalf of the local residents and businesses living and working in Princes Road, Middlesbrough (Newport ward). This representation is made in support of the review application made by Cleveland Police against off licensed premises situated at 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough on the grounds that this premise is being operated in such a manner that does not support the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective.

Princes Road, particularly in the immediate vicinity of the Premier Shop has a history of antisocial behaviour related to street drinkers and beggars. Known individuals who are alcohol dependent congregate on Princes Road on a daily basis openly drinking alcohol in the street, sit on random doorsteps drinking (making entry and exit difficult for residents), become aggressive when challenged and cause a general nuisance for residents and business owners. Some have been known to sleep on the pavement outside commercial and residential properties and urinate in the street in clear view of members of the public. Most can barely stand up or even hold a conversation due to the amount of alcohol they have consumed making it very intimidating for residents in particular as well as visitors to businesses. It is not uncommon for the street drinkers to approach business owners and customers for money and often try to sell items for cash. These individuals are regularly seen with high content cheap alcohol purchased from the Premier Shop.

Additional and more detailed evidence will be submitted prior to any future licensing-sub committee hearing.

Hi.

I would like to raise as ward councillor my concerns around this premises. The concerns began almost as soon as I was elected as Prince's road was a major place for streets drinkers and this was aided by a couple of factors one of which is this premises. I have been involved and consulted on two different action plans to guide this shop into operating in a way that helps the community and sadly neither has been adhered. The first action plan was warranted after I raised concerns from my community that they would often see one of the shop workers engaging outside the shop with the street drinkers and allegations from both residents and the street drinkers themselves indicated that you could buy not only alcohol but Zopiclones as well. There was also a tick system and there seemed to be no regulation. The action plan was set up and the shop worker was eventually let go and then covid struck.

I had hoped that upon the shop reopening fully lessons would have been learned but sadly this is not the case, ASB from street drinkers is a major issue in this area and it is aided by selling high strength alcohol at accessible pricing. This is not a shop where someone returning from work can grab a bottle of wine and has no place having a license at all. Should the premises seek to be an asset to the community it would not sell high strength cider as single cans for a cheap rate in an area blighted with an increased level of alcohol dependency.

As a further impact to the community the premises has also been flytipping their excess waste into the street bins (residents witnessed) leading to an effect of having not only ASB on the streets but increased litter with no where to deposit it.

As for restrictions or conditions, why would we believe that these would be followed given the lack of adherence to the following licensing conditions leading up to 2019 then a further lack of adherence to an action plan placed on the premises in 2019. Every single issue found in fault at the premises during the inspection comes with a backdrop

of increased involvement from the council and police and gives, in my opinion zero excuse for errors as the premises have had more than enough warning and time to improve.

My name is Nicola Kenny and I am a Neighbourhood Safety Officer (NSO) covering areas of Newport designated as Selective Landlord Licensing areas. My primary role is to investigate issues of antisocial behaviour and low level crime within my designated locality and deliver interventions and/or enforcement action to ultimately alleviate those issues. With this in mind my role is essentially one of enforcement although my involvement is often more holistic due to the nature and complexity of the problems.

I have been an NSO for Newport since February 2021 and during this time Princes Road has been a popular location for rough sleepers and individuals with varying degrees of drug/alcohol dependency. This small location is attractive to vulnerable individuals for 2 primary reasons:

- 1. The Neighbourhood Welfare Café provides hot meals and basic everyday items to those who are homeless
- 2. Lifestyle Express selling cheap, high content alcohol.

Prior to me becoming the NSO for Newport, my colleague had previously dealt with the same re-occurring alcohol related issues in and around this area of Princes Road and agrees that the access to cheap, high content alcohol is a contributing factor to the ongoing disorder faced by residents and businesses.

When I was first introduced to the area evidence of street drinking was apparent by the number of empty cans of alcohol littering Princes Road in the immediate vicinity of the Lifestyle Express known locally as the Premier Shop and in the areas know to be frequented by street drinkers. Furthermore, it was not uncommon to actually see individuals openly drinking a particular brand of alcohol known to be sold by the Lifestyle Express or leaving the same shop having purchased alcohol. Street teams responsible for disposing of the litter also informed me that it is a daily struggle removing all the cans from gutters and over flowing bins.

Many of the individuals, by their own admission are attracted to the area for a multitude of reasons but primarily due to the access they have to food and cheap alcohol. The Neighbourhood Welfare Cafe is not open for food every day of the week but the street drinkers that frequent Princes Road would remain in the area regardless as access to alcohol was their priority and this need was met by Lifestyle Express.

In addition to this, Princes Road consists of back to back street houses so front doors open directly on to the street. Although residents were reluctant to come forward with concerns, likely due to the fear of reprisals, some complaints were

received about drinkers sitting on random doorsteps making it difficult for the occupants to leave their property not only due to the obstruction this caused but also for fear of retaliation should they challenge the individual(s) responsible.

Businesses also reported fighting between those who frequent the area to drink and reports of the same individuals urinating in the street was not uncommon. One landlord even showed me photos he had taken of two known alcohol dependent males passed out on the pavement and clearly intoxicated.

To help fund their addiction, many of the street drinkers would approach business owners and their customers for money, often having random items to offer in exchange for cash. Business owners would be naturally wary of these individuals due to their behaviour and temperament which could sometimes be volatile and intimidating. Their primary concern was the welfare of their customers who were often left shaken and threatened when approached.

On some occasions shop staff found it necessary to keep the door to their premises locked therefore having to let each customer on to the premises as they arrived, locking the door behind them to avoid the street drinkers entering the shop. However, the street drinkers would continue to loiter outside in order to intercept customers as they arrived and would even approach members of the public sitting in their cars.

One of the biggest challenges to addressing the alcohol related antisocial behaviour was dealing with a resident of Princes Road who was also alcohol

dependent and who was allowing the street drinkers in to his property. This became an attractive location for many alcohol and drug dependent individuals across Newport and fast became a constant source of disruption. Following discussions with the tenant he openly admitted to purchasing his alcohol from Lifestyle Express. Enforcement action has since been taken and has resulted in a noticeable reduction in incidents. However, this did not stop known individuals continuing to loiter on Princes Road to consume alcohol on a daily basis.

Whilst monitoring the area, following a surge in complaints it soon became evident that those who were responsible for the disorder were regular visitors to Princes Road and not random individuals just passing through. Over time you come to know the individuals that frequent the area and begin to build a trust that not only encourages their engagement with you but also helps directly address their chaotic lifestyles and the reasons for their addictions. Simply moving them on, as many businesses expected us to do, did not address the issue and enforcement action such as a fine was a futile attempt to solve a problem than ran far deeper than just street drinking. With this in mind and due to the disproportionate levels of alcohol related disorder in such a small area, in May 2022 I was tasked with addressing all the issues relating to Princes Road and in particular the section between Percy Street and Pelham Street. This small area included a number of residential dwellings and several business including Lifestyle Express. The implementation of this action plan, in partnership with Cleveland Police, led to contact being made with licensing to help determine if there was anything that could be done to control or address the sale of alcohol to

those individuals dependent on it. This resulted in a joint visit to the Lifestyle Express.

On Friday July 15th 2022 I accompanied PC Thorpe from Cleveland Police and Fiona Helyer, Public Health Officer with Middlesbrough Council on a visit to the premises to discuss our concerns with the shop owner or manager. As I walked along Princes Road I noticed several of the usual drinkers taking up their usual positions on the street. All of those drinking were doing so openly and clearly had alcohol in their possession and more specifically brands regularly sold at Lifestyle Express.

During the visit I discussed with Mr Iqbal, who had previously identified himself as the owner of the business, my concerns with regards to the recent increase in alcohol related nuisance on Princes Road and how I felt this was related to the alcohol that was currently available in his store.

I explained that many of his customers were known to be alcohol dependant and whilst he may not be aware of each individuals circumstances, it was clear that most of those customers were often under the influence of alcohol, showed obvious signs of alcohol consumption such as slurred speech when in the shop and were also regular daily visitors not only to the store but to the immediate location in general.

Mr Iqbal indicated that he was fully aware of who I was referring to and even explained steps that he had taken to prevent any risk of problems whilst they were in the shop. Mr Iqbal explained that he would only let one of the individuals in to the store at any one time and that he limited the amount of cans they

purchased to just 4 at a time. I explained that while this may prevent any problems occurring in the store, the cheap, high content alcohol he was selling was still likely to be contributing to the issues occurring on the street outside and that the next step may be to refuse sales to those individuals completely to allow services to tackle the ongoing issues. His response was that he was willing to try but he did show concerns about repercussions.

Furthermore, I noticed a considerable amount of stock of a particular brand of cider stacked on the shop floor. This was the same brand of choice of all the street drinkers and the same cans found littering the streets each day. This confirmed suspicions that Lifestyle Express was the source of the alcohol and that the amount of stock was to meet demand.

However, following the inspection, both police and council licensing agreed it appropriate to temporarily suspend all sales of alcohol due to discrepancies linked to licensing conditions.

During a follow up visit to the premises on Wednesday 20th July an individual known to me to be alcohol dependant entered the store looking for the cheap cider she was so used to buying. When I explained to her that it was no longer being sold from here she purchased a bottle of wine instead.

Shortly after this another individual known to me to be alcohol dependent entered the store but left without making a purchase. I spoke to him upon leaving the shop and he confirmed that he had intended to buy alcohol. When I asked what he usually buys he confirmed the brand of cider that we suspected as being the primary choice for all the alcohol dependent customers.

It has to be appreciated that the access to alcohol is only a contributing factor to the ongoing issues and not the direct cause of it. Following the removal of a specific brand of cheap, high content alcohol from Lifestyle Express a significant drop in incidents was noticeably apparent. Furthermore, the number of individuals who would remain in the immediate vicinity of the shop to consume alcohol also reduced over the following days. As part of the Princes Road Action Plan, a number of services offered assistance to several vulnerable individuals known for their alcohol dependency and have since managed to offer interventions to address their housing needs and addictions resulting in a significant decrease in incidents and complaints. Without Mr Iqbal's cooperation, delivering interventions would have proved more difficult and therefore requires continued commitment from him if we are to manage the issues effectively in the future.

1. Summary of Applications:

The purpose of this report is to enable Members to consider an application for the transfer of the premises licence and an application to vary the designated premises supervisor at Lifestyle Express, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough following representations from Cleveland Police.

On 28 July 2022 applications were received from Abuzar Naveed to transfer the premises licence to Parveen Akhtar Iqbal and to vary the designated premises supervisor to Parveen Akhtar Iqbal. Copies of these applications are attached at **Appendicies 2 and 3.**

Members should be aware that only the Police can object to such applications where they believe that the grant of the applications would undermine the crime and disorder licensing objective.

2. Legislation

The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Licensing Authority to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety

The Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Licensing Policy and any guidance issued by the Secretary of State.

3. Consultation on the applications

On 29 July 2022 representations to the applications was received from Cleveland Police objecting to the applications on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder. Cleveland Police state that they do not believe that Mr Naveed has been in control of the premises since April 2021 and that the issues at the premises have continued under the new management. A copy of this representation is attached at **Appendix 4.**

4. Background

The Lifestyle Express store, is a busy convenience store situated on a busy residential road with a mixture of residential and business premises. The area has historically been part of the Council's Cumulative Impact Area which has lapsed but the Council are seeking to reinstate in the very near future. A location plan is attached at **Appendix 5.**

The premises have had the benefit of a premises licence since 14 April 2009 and Mr Abuzar Naveed has been the premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor since that time.



Cleveland Police have received an application made under the Licensing Act 2003 for a transfer of premises licence for Lifestyle Express, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough and an application to vary the Designated Premise Supervisor for the same premise.

Cleveland Police wish to object to both applications for the following reasons,

Cleveland Police have recently submitted an application to review the licence for the premise due to issues of disorder ASB and alcohol related incidents in the area around the premise, and believe that the premise is not upholding the four licensing objectives. This review is not specific to the currently named DPS Mr Naveed as we believe Mr Naveed does not have day to day control of the premise and has not had day to day control since handing over the lease in April 2021. We also believe that the issues have continued under the new management who is the husband of the new applicant wishing to be named as DPS.

We therefore do not think it is appropriate to accept these applications at this time until the outcome of the review hearing is determined and would object to both applications outright at this moment in time.

Disorder, Prevention of Public Nuisance, and Public Safety.

The Lifestyle Express store, 22-24 Princes Road, Middlesbrough is a busy convenience store situated on a busy residential road with a mixture of residential and business premises. The area has historically been part of the council's Cumulative Impact Area (CIA) which has lapsed but the council are seeking to reinstate in the very near future and this area will again be part of this for very good reason.

During 2019/2020 we had several meetings with the Designated Premise Supervisor (DPS) Mr Naveed, regarding on going issues of street drinking, disorder and crime which were linked to the sale of alcohol from the premise. Mr Naveed agreed to an Action Plan which was in full flow with positive results as of January 2020 until the pandemic hit causing lockdowns and restrictions.

After the lifting of restrictions, the store fully re-opened and Mr Naveed handed the reigns over to Mr Iqbal, although Mr Naveed remains on the licence as the named DPS. The incidents have again slowly increased, with the premise again selling stronger cans of beer, cider and lager and selling them as individual cans at a cost of between 99p and £1.20 a can.

The incidents have reached a crescendo with street drinking, Anti-social behaviour and nuisance being a daily occurrence and the familiar black cans of cheap high ABV cider

being ever present. Street Enforcement and the Neighbourhood Police team have both taken steps to deal with the issues and have visited the store on a number of occasions.

Police Licensing along with Public Health visited the premise on Friday 15th July 2022. On arrival we immediately saw two females arguing outside the shop, the arguing was becoming more intense, and the situation was escalating. We had to step in to put a stop to the incident. As the situation was calming and the females were walking away a male across the road drinking from a Black can began to shout across the road at the officers. I approached the male who was drinking a can of Knights cider which is sold from the store we were attending, and he had another can of the same drink next to him. Knights is a high ABV (8.4% ABV) and low cost (£1.20 a can sold as single cans). He was clearly drunk, his eyes glazed, and his speech slurred. The male was spoken and told to leave the area. These types of incidents are not unusual in this area.

On entering the store and looking around we saw Perry products for sale on the shelves (a breach of the premise licence conditions), high ABV single cans of cider making up a large portion of the alcohol for sale, and the majority of litre plus bottles of cider were again high ABV. Mr Iqbal was serving and watching over the store and when asked confirmed that he was in charge and that he had been running the business since last year. He was asked why Mr Naveed was still named as DPS on the licence, but Mr Iqbal had no satisfactory answer. As we were of the opinion that there was no DPS in day-to-day control of the premises Mt Iqbal was asked to refrain from the sale of alcohol until the matter was resolved, removing alcohol from floor displays, covering the refrigerated alcohol and

refusing any further requests for sale. Mr Iqbal agreed to this and was seen to refuse the next few customers' service of alcohol while we were there.

Police Licensing, Public Health, Council Licensing and Street Enforcement officers attended the store again on Tuesday 19th July 2022 at 13:15 hours. Mr Iqbal was again in attendance, but Mr Naveed was also there serving from behind the counter. Mr Naveed stated he was there as DPS and when asked considered that he was in day-to-day control of the premises. Mr Naveed was asked to demonstrate the CCTV, he stated that there had been some problems with the CCTV. When he tried to go back to show us footage from previous days it was found that CCTV was only on from that day and no previous CCTV had been recorded. This was despite our visit on Friday 15th July and the council's visit on Monday 18th July when Mr Iqbal had been asked about the CCTV on both occasions. Mr Naveed was then asked to produce Training records, the incident book and the refusals book. Mr Naveed produced three books which all looked brand new, in fact the training record had a price label on it which looked new. There were entries in the training book and the refusals log, but they all looked to be in the same pen and by the same person. The books were seized as evidence.

Mr Naveed attended the Civic Centre, Middlesbrough for a meeting with responsible authorities regarding the issues at Lifestyle Express. He explained that for the past two weeks he had been there on the Monday of both for a maximum of two hours and estimated his regular attendance as four hours a week which I do not believe fulfils his obligation of day to day running of the premise. He does not have responsibility for stock,



staff wages, or other managerial duties and holds down a part time job elsewhere. He was unwilling to acknowledge the issues in the area and could not see the part the store played in the problems. He also said that on re-opening after the COVID restrictions he did not continue with the Action Plan that had been agreed in January 2020 which he did agree probably did not help.

We have since received an application to vary the Designated Premises Supervisor for the premises which we have objected to awaiting the outcome of this review hearing.

A review of any premises licence is the last resort, and we will always strive to met the premises needs in other ways before resorting to this however the familiar cycle of issues with the premises have forced our hands. Unfortunately, the running of the premise does not instil us with the confidence that matters could be put right in the short term, leading to further disruption for the residents and possible ASB and disorder. With their continued sale of single can high strength alcohol and large bottles of high ABV white cider we believe that the Licensing Objectives as a consequence are and will continue to be undermined.





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
