This is the second application made by the applicant for this premise the first was made in October 2021 and objections were submitted by Responsible Authorities including the police and Public Health. This went before the Middlesbrough Borough Council Licensing Sub-Committee on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2022 where evidence was put forward by all parties. The Sub-Committee decision was to refuse the application, and I have exhibited the formal decision in its entirety as AJT/1. I am also exhibiting PC1845 Jason Arbuckle's statement objecting to this first application as AJT/2 so as not to duplicate evidence already submitted in a formal hearing.

The area in which the licence is sought formed part of the council's Cumulative Impact Area and was subject until recently to a Cumulative Impact Policy which the council are currently in the process of re-applying for as the issues in the area continue.

I have asked our analysts at Cleveland Police to review the area for alcohol related incidents including, violence, disorder, anti-social behaviour and Domestic Violence incidents. I asked for the period from PC Arbuckle's last request. The finding are very similar to those of the original analysts report and I have shown below the tables for All Crime and All Alcohol Related Crime as PC Arbuckle did which show figures which are more than comparable with those demonstrated in his statement for the last hearing.

Once again the figures shown are more than comparable to the figures shown in the tables in PC Arbuckle's statement and clearly show that the issues raised by PC Arbuckle still exist and are still relevant in the discussion around this application.

PC Arbuckle's concerns around the consumption of alcohol before during and after the pandemic and its associated "Lockdowns" are still relevant and are concerns held by myself an officer of 20 years' experience the same as PC Arbuckle. We need to be sure that any licence applications regardless of the applicant are right for the community they are being applied for and that they will not have a negative impact on the same community regardless of the experience and the good standing of the applicant and it is for the applicant to show that this will not be the case for an area where the community already suffers from alcohol related incidents and there is already pressure on the already pressured emergency and support services in the area.
