3. Legislation

The Licensing Act 2003 requires the Licensing Authority to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives:

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- Public Safety
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance

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The Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Licensing Policy and any guidance issued by the Secretary of State.

4. Background

The premises are situated in a small parade of shops on Broughton Avenue, Easterside amongst other retail outlets and alcohol licensed premises. The applicant intends to supply a full range of fresh, frozen and ambient foods, together with a selection of high quality wines, beers and spirits. A location plan is attached at **Appendix 2.**

5. The Representations

On 17 April 2020 a representation was received from Anita Zabrocky, a local resident and the Vice Chair of Ladgate Community Council, objecting to the application on the grounds of anti-social behaviour and public nuisance issues. A copy of that representation is attached at **Appendix 3**.

Mrs Zabrocky has subsequently confirmed that she doesn't wish to attend the Committee meeting but wishes for Members to consider her written representations including further correspondence dated 27 May 2020 which is also attached at Appendix 3.

On 17 April 2020 a representation was received from Mr Jeffrey Zabrocky, a local resident, objecting to the application on the grounds of anti-social behaviour and public nuisance issues. A copy of that representation is attached at **Appendix 4**.

Mr Zabrocky has subsequently confirmed that he doesn't wish to attend the Committee meeting but wishes for Members to consider his written representations.

On 5 May 2020 a representation was received from Karen Horne on behalf of Ladgate Community Council objecting to the application on the grounds of anti-social behaviour and public nuisance issues. A copy of this representation is attached at **Appendix 5.**

Karen Horne has subsequently confirmed that she doesn't wish to attend the Committee meeting but wishes for Members to consider her written representations including further correspondence dated 29 May 2020 which is also attached at Appendix 5.

In response to the consultation, the Council's officers from Public Health and Officers from Cleveland Police had concerns about the initial content of the application. However, following discussions with officers the applicant has agreed to implement certain conditions, including an amendment to the opening times. Both Public Health and Cleveland Police officers have no objections to the grant of a licence on the basis of these agreed conditions being imposed on the licence. A copy of the list of conditions agreed with the applicant by Public Health and Cleveland Police officers is attached at **Appendix 6**.

8. Members' Options

Members may consider the following options:

- 1. Grant the application subject to conditions consistent with the operating schedule modified to such extent as considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 2. To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
- 3. To reject the application.

Members are reminded that any aggrieved party (i.e. Applicant, Responsible Authority, Other Person) may appeal any decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court.

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
